From the Headmaster

The start of this academic year was seen by us as a continued opportunity to further develop MGS through the eyes of our two pillars of learning and belonging. We have continued to inspire the students to learn, to be curious and to have a zest for discovery. And we have also continued to inspire them to belong, to feel safe and supported, to be able to give service and leadership to their school, and to grow into kinder people - re-connecting them with their fellow Maidstonians.

Just recently, a number of our year 13 students were on interview for places at Oxford and Cambridge, and more have started their interviews for medicine or dentistry. The growth of this high level of academia is something we







are looking to build from the earliest years at MGS, and the popularity of Oxplore in Key Stage 3 has been particularly exciting. The Senior Debating Society has continued to go from strength to strength with competitions at Oxford and Cambridge coming up in the New Year, as well as the Mock Trial in January. This has been really driven by a core team of students who are going to Harvard in January to take part in the Model United Nations Conference. Back in September we had a huge Higher Education Fair so more of our students can learn about studying at university - and it is by getting involved in these wider, challenging opportunities at school that the pathway to university becomes clearer. We have had the whole of Year 7 go out to Bletchley to learn about Scherbius's Enigma Machine; the Autumn Showcase, where those involved took on some very challenging pieces; and we have been really pleased by the growth in the number of our older students leading societies. This has been a term that has stretched many of our students.

Since September we've also seen our programme of clubs, activities and societies, also known as MGS Extra, go from strength to strength. Well over 50 clubs and societies are currently running, covering almost every conceivable interest, from War Hammer to Chess Club, and from robotics to linguistics. There is a real buzz of activity and excitement around the school at lunchtime and after school in the many clubs and societies and it has been great to see Maidstonians come together

and support each other. Earlier this academic year we delivered a presentation on sexual consent to all of Year 12 and since September we've been talking to all of our students in age appropriate ways to develop their understanding of consent in day-to-day interactions, including respecting the boundaries and personal space of others. A series of student-led assemblies, led by Barton House, took place in October as a part of Black History Month and our ever growing Equality, Diversity and Inclusivity agenda. These assemblies celebrated a number of lesser known Black Britons such as Evelyn Dove, Oliver Morris, Roy Hackett, Martin Griffiths and Walter Tull. In November, Barton House also led on Anti Bullying week, and on Monday 14 November it was heartening to see so many Maidstonians wear odds socks and their own ties to raise funds for the Anti-Bullying Alliance. Our house councils and school council also met this term and a number of themes emerged including: how can we make our school a much more greener community; and how can we improve our rewards system? The councils will flesh these out in more detail when they next meet in the New Year. Also in the New Year we will continue our preparations for the School's 475th anniversary which will take place in the 2023-2024 academic year. Preparations for this launched this term with the MGS 475 logo competition and I look forward to sharing the winning design with you all shortly.

One other significant development this year has been to look at ways in which we can be more involved

in sustainable projects involving the entire school community. We are about to complete a project to replace all the lights in many of our older buildings with motion sensor LED lights, and we are in the early stages of auditing our roof space with a view to investing in solar panels to further reduce the school's carbon footprint. We have also made a good start at getting rid of single-use plastic by introducing re-fillable bottles for drinks in the Refectory. We want to encourage student involvement in helping us achieve a 'greener school', and this will be launched early next year. We want several student-led projects to begin as soon as possible so that we, at Maidstone Grammar School, can to do our bit to not just help conserve the Earth's resources but also understand how we can support biodiversity in and around the school site.

Moving now to the family of staff, at the end of every term we sometimes have to say goodbye to those members of staff who are leaving the MGS community. Well this term we are saying au revoir to two: Miss Deo and Miss Sandhu, and goodbye to five: Mrs Rathbone, Mrs O'Neil, Mr Baker, Mrs Harriss and Mr Friend. Both Miss Deo and Miss Sandhu are leaving us for a while to have a baby, and so we wish them and their families all the best. To the leaving staff, Mrs Rathbone has taught mathematics here for the last two years, and in that time has made significant contributions to the department. She is leaving us to pursue other ventures outside of teaching. Mrs O'Neil has been

integral to the workings of the school for seven years working as the finance manager in the Bursary. She is retiring at the start of January and will probably spend some of her retirement in Australia where her daughter recently moved to. Mr Baker has been teaching business studies and economics at MGS for the last eight years, and he leaves us to become a head of department at a local school. Mrs Harriss officially leaves MGS in January and has worked as a cover supervisor for nearly 20 years. In that time she has covered thousands of lessons when teachers were absent. It is a hugely important role in the school, and so we thank Mrs Harriss immensely for her service and commitment to MGS and to the many thousands of Maidstonians she has supported. And finally, we say goodbye to Mr Friend, our D&T technician who has worked here for 27 years. He is known by virtually every student of the school, and by the tens of thousands of students who have come before them. He has helped them with their designs, assisted them using the machinery, and supported them in their constructions. He is more than just a member of staff. He is going to be missed by many right across the school, but particularly those within the D&T department. Thank you Mr Friend and best wishes for a long and happy retirement. We wish them all the best.


Finally, I wish to thank you, the parents, the students and the staff for the tremendous efforts shown during this year. 2022 has been

Duke of Edinburgh Award Update

C ince the beginning of the academic year, 65 students in Year 9 have made a start on their Bronze Award, and 33 Students in Years 10 and 11 have started their Silver Award. It's encouraging to see a great variety of different skills, physical activities and volunteering opportunities being embarked upon; some examples include marksmanship, volunteering in animal welfare, learning sign language and completing a course in money management.

In addition to new enrolments, Year 10 Bronze participants completed their assessed expedition back in September. It took place at Adamswell Scout Campsite near Tunbridge Wells, and the cool, dry weather offered excellent walking conditions. There was some positive feedback from the assessors about quite a few of the groups and most students seem to have really enjoyed the experience. As George in Year 10 said: "I found it really valuable to learn to be cohesive within a team environment and the entire experience was a great opportunity to gain some independence."

54 participants who started their Bronze expedition in September 2021 have now successfully completed their award. Congratulations to all those involved. We look forward to getting the expeditions rolling again next season.

Harvard Trip 2023



Tn the next school term, January 2023, Maidstone Grammar School will be sending 24 students to the USA to take part in the annual Harvard Model United Nations conference (HMUN). This international debating competition is an incredible opportunity for students to debate the most pressing world issues, and draft original responses to them.

The preparation for this event began last year, for Year 13s, and in September for Year 12s. This competitive opportunity has required hard work from all students and staff involved. Each school taking part is allocated two countries to represent; neither of which can be their own. Prior to these allocations, preparations involved mock debates, in which we were given a minute to state our position in relation to a proposed question. We have also been reading and annotating our delegate booklets, provided by Harvard, which offer guidance in how to approach this conference, and what exactly it entails.

In the past week MGS has been allocated its countries, and we were all surprised to learn that we have been given Ukraine and Indonesia. One MGS student will represent Indonesia, and the remaining 23 students will represent Ukraine. Due to its international importance currently, with the War in Ukraine, our preparation will be even more intense and rigorous than usual; however, this will also be hugely rewarding as it is an amazing opportunity to maximise our involvement in the conference. In the past year it has been near impossible to avoid the tragic news of Ukraine, giving us a lot to draw upon. Further preparation will involve extensive research into not only our designated countries, but other nations at the conference, and their relation to either Ukraine or Indonesia. This could manifest itself in reading articles, papers, books, or any other works on the countries and listening to podcasts or documentaries about the important issues that will be raised at the conference. Preparation will look different to each of us, as we have individual roles within the conference, so we are tailoring our work towards this. Additionally, we are preparing for the conference by working on understanding the complexities of the United Nations. We will each be required to write position papers, outlining what we want our countries to achieve from the conference.

Particularly helpful in preparing us for HMUN was the training given by four Old Maidstonians who had previously attended the conference. In this session we learnt more about the way in which the conference is structured, and what we will be required to do. We were also able to practise speaking and debating in some of the more complicated contexts in which we will find ourselves. Perhaps most useful was the advice they gave from their personal experiences, giving us insight into the reality of taking part in HMUN. We are all hugely grateful for their support and aim to continue their successes in January.

Finally, a key part of our preparation has been the support and organisation from all members of staff involved in the trip, particularly that of Mrs Van Mol, who has led every after-school session for us. She has organised, inspired, and motivated each of us to achieve our very best at the conference in January 2023. We hope to make the school proud of our participation in HMUN next term.

CCF Army Section

This year the army section has focused on progression in all aspects of our craft, aiming to resolve the skill fade we have suffered throughout the covid period. This has seen the army leadership team, a group of 6 Year 13 students working alongside the officers within the section to improve our planning, communication and quality of training. These three qualities are aspects we have felt will lay the strongest foundations for our cadets, whilst still providing an enjoyable but beneficial training program.

So far our newest cadets, Year 9, have learnt drill, first aid, fieldcraft and navigational skills at a basic level, in preparation for their first experience outside the school grounds for their recruit camp in February. This will show the cadets what life is like on a military camp, the etiquette, protocols such as room inspections, as well as a chance to show off what they have learnt so far.

Within Year 10, they have begun a more advanced syllabus, taking all they learnt in Year 9 and layering those skills with added complexity. This year is also a time for them to demonstrate their commitment and leadership potential as we begin to promote individuals who we see as adept in their craft, positive minded and a good role model to those around them.

Year 11s have been undertaking a course called CFIT since the start of September. Taught by out of school staff from the cadet training team, the Cadet Forces Instructional Technique course teaches the cadets to conduct their own lessons, and is imperative to the section as without skillful, confident teachers, our cadets would not be gaining a quality education.

Therefore our Year 12s have been putting this into practice, conducting lessons to a high standard to those in Year 9 and 10. Although sometimes challenging, these lessons will allow our senior cadets to plan and conduct sessions, developing their own personal skills as they find out what methods work for them.

Last but not least, we have begun our additional competition training, open to Year 10 through to 13 in preparation for our Military Skills competition which we will attend around easter. By providing additional training, those who wish to go beyond expectations can train at our highest possible level. We hope to place high enough at our regional competition to once again participate in the national Cambrian patrol, in which we achieved a silver medal during our 2022 attempt.

CCF Royal Navy Section

Within a few weeks of school starting we were invited to visit HMS Trumpeter, an archer-class patrol vessel, at the Chatham Docks. At the docks, cadets were able to tour the vessel guided by the ships crew, giving a first-hand experience of life on a Royal Navy patrol vessel. After spending a few hours on the ship the cadets were then able to wonder the docks seeing HMS Victory, the wooden ex-flagship, as well as the decommissioned submarine HMS Ocelot.

Upon return from the trip it was time to complete basic training in drill and general knowledge, with Remembrance Parade only two short months away. This involved weekly sessions dedicated to drill to get cadets up to marching standard while teaching the new recruits the basics. This process was greatly aided by tips from visiting Chief Scott from the Royal Navy, helping us to perform correct and proper Royal Navy drill.

After the Remembrance Parade the focus in CCF sessions shifted to knowledge and practical leadership tasks. With three different lessons being given every week, taught by both senior leadership and lower ranked cadets, who showed great passion in their performance.

The future for the Royal Navy section this year is filled with opportunities. During Extended Learning Week cadets will have the opportunity to attend the annual trip to Scotland for a week, being the crew for on of the fleet tenders and seeing the base HMNB Clyde. In the summer we will be kayaking and canoeing on the lake or river, with the new recruits learning the basic skills and older cadets honing their skills or helping to teach others. Finally we received news we will be receiving new updates uniform in the new academic year, making us uniform to the actual Royal Navy.



Tonbridge House Prefect Team

School Council

This term saw a gathering of the School Council to discuss issues raised through three specific sources within the school. The first through the staff Senior Leadership Team, the second through House Council Meetings, and the third through student's specifically raising issues with various members of both the student and staff bodies. In this way we aim to improve communication and connection throughout the school community.

The first point raised during the council was the 'Green Agenda'; an initiative to reduce the school's environmental impact. Positive points about our progress so far included the introduction of School Water Bottles in place of single use plastic bottles, as well as more recycling bins being available in classrooms. However we recognise areas that still need to improve, like the removal of single use plastics from the entire school.

Our move towards a more digitally aware school was also discussed, raising the need to remove paper timetables and information slips to reduce waste, and improve the information provided on how to access online resources. Secondly, using the digital screens already around the school to provide information more effectively was also raised.

The issue of littering was also mentioned, with suggestions to implement harsher punishments for people seen actively littering and to improve the difference between our recycling bins and ordinary waste bins in addition to upping the quality of education on how to more effectively recycle or reuse waste.

The second item discussed was anonymous reporting of concerns. The unattractiveness of reporting concerns was discussed and suggestions included offering different ways to report concerns, removing the formality of the process, and providing more professional training for prefects to act as a more friendly and approachable body for students to take concerns to.

The third item addressed was about integration between year groups in form time. Some forms have no issues with relationships between year groups, but others would like more structured form time and issues with the formality of form times was also mentioned. Suggestions including rotating seating plans and more time to talk to other students, more widespread implementation of "Mentoring Monday" and similar schemes to facilitate greater connection in forms specifically.

The fourth and final item discussed was about the rewards system. The regularity and frequency of rewards between teachers was raised and a desire from the student body for more variety in the rewards offered was discussed. Suggestions include rewards that accumulate and can be exchanged for privileges or rewards for progress and personal improvement.

The Student Council's aim is to raise issues for the staff and student body to address. All the issues raised in our meetings are carried forward into subsequent more targeted meetings between those able to enact the changes necessary for an evolving school such as MGS.

From the Archive

In 1922 the first Shakespearean play, Twelfth Night' was performed at MGS; the War Office donated two Wireless Telegraphy Sets to the school; and rugby became the school's official winter sport. And all of this occurred exactly 100 years ago!

In 1930 when workhouses were abolished in the UK the Junior School from Brunswick House was incorporated into the new main school in Barton Road – the school that we are in now.

In 1668 the 13th headmaster, John Law, was admonished for frequenting alehouses. Twenty three years later he was indicted for murder, but refused to leave the school buildings until an order was given by the Queen!

In 1554 the School was closed for four years following Maidstone's sympathy with Sir Thomas Wyatt and cancellation of the town's charter. The Princess Elizabeth (later Elizabeth I) was imprisoned in the Tower of London by Queen Mary.

Did you know when Maidstone Grammar Schools was celebrating its 300th anniversary, Harrods Store was just opening for the first time in London.

Year 7 Learning to Learn

Since the start of Year 7, I and the rest of Year 7 taken a subject called Learn to Learn, in which a student learns how to use very useful skills for revision and studying. This course of study is only learnt in the first year at MGS and it is extremely helpful. Learn to Learn covers lots of techniques to help us revise and study for tests, GCSEs and A-Levels and how to manage time wisely.

Mindsets

In this branch of study, we have spent a few lessons on mindsets. A mindset is how you approach something. A person can have a fixed or growth mindset. When learning you want to have a growth mindset. Having a growth mindset means you are open to learning new things and you believe that you can become better if you try. There are a lot of features to a growth mindset like; believing that effort leads to mastery; intelligence and talent can be developed; mistakes are part of learning; failures are opportunities to improve; failing is temporary; and viewing others successes can be inspirational. Having a fixed mindset, however, can be a negative thing. We have learnt that if you want to set goals and have a growth mindset, you can add the word "yet" to make it positive. For example, if someone said, "I can't code well" that would be having a fixed mindset because they would be saying that they aren't good at it now and cannot improve. Although, if they put "yet" at the end, it means that they are not good at it now but want to get better at coding. It is very important to have a sensible

growth mind set because if you tell yourself, you can do something enough times; you will believe that you can do it.

The Learning Brain

Your brain learns at every moment whether you know it or not. Inside your brain, there are these things called neural pathways. You can think of them as roads from point A to point B. Neural pathways are how your brain learns things, and as you get better at those things, the neural pathways strengthen. When you were learning how to do long division, your road from A to B is like a 'dirt road' that isn't very clear. As you get better at doing long division, your road becomes more efficient, because your 'dirt road' turns into a 'motorway'. Different people have different ways to strengthen their neural pathways best. There are three ways to do this: hearing it, seeing it, or doing it.

Note Taking

In Learn to Learn, we have learnt many ways about how to take notes such as the Cornell Note Taking Method, paraphrasing, and skimming and scanning. The Cornell Note Taking Method takes the essential parts of texts and puts them down into a title, some headings, notes and a summary. Paraphrasing is putting a text into your own words, and it can be done by changing the order of certain words, using synonymous words, and keeping the main idea. Skimming is a type of fast reading that requires you to look through content quickly to understand the heart of the matter. Scanning is when you also read quickly but when you read, you don't give some sections of a text as much attention as others.

I think that Learn to Learn is a very helpful subject that can assist students well when they need to revise and study. It can help pupils manage their time well, be effective at note taking and help develop a correct attitude to learning.






