PROVIDER ACCESS POLICY

Introduction

This policy statement sets out the school's arrangements for managing the access of providers to the school for the purpose of giving them information about the provider's education or training offer. This complies with the school's legal obligations under Section 42B of the Education Act 1997.

Pupil entitlement

All pupils in years 8 to 13 are entitled:

• to find out about technical education qualifications and apprenticeships opportunities, as part of a careers programme which provides information on the full range of education and training options available at each transition point;

• to hear from a range of local providers about the opportunities they offer, including technical education and apprenticeships – through options events, assemblies and group discussions and taster events;

• to understand how to make applications for the full range of academic and technical courses.

For pupils of compulsory school age these encounters are mandatory and there will be a minimum of:

- two encounters for pupils during the 'first key phase' (year 8 to 9) and
- two encounters for pupils during the 'second key phase' (year 10 to 11).
- For pupils in the 'third key phase' (year 12 to 13), particularly those that have not yet decided on their next steps, there are two more provider encounters available during this period, which are optional for pupils to attend.

These provider encounters will be scheduled during the main school hours and the provider will be given a reasonable amount of time to, as a minimum:

- share information about both the provider and the approved technical education qualification and apprenticeships that the provider offers
- explain what career routes those options could lead to
- provide insights into what it might be like to learn or train with that provider (including the opportunity to meet staff and pupils from the provider)
- answer questions from pupils.

Meaningful provider encounters

One encounter is defined as one meeting/session between pupils and one provider. We are committed to providing meaningful encounters to all pupils using the <u>Making it meaningful</u> <u>checklist</u>.

Meaningful online engagement is also an option, and we are open to providers that are able to provide live online engagement with our pupils.

• Providers are welcome to visit the school at any time to give presentations about their education, employment or training offer during assemblies to relevant year groups

• Providers are welcome to visit the school at any time to give information about their provision to relevant year groups. Interested students are able to sign up to attend.

Career Mentoring (OMS Inform and Inspire Mentoring Scheme)

• We offer all pupils, in Year 11 upwards, the opportunity to have careers mentor from our Old Maidstonian Alumni network. If you would like to be involved with the scheme, please contact our Careers Team for more information.
